

HOW DOES THE FEAST HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM ADDRESS THE AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM?

The FEAST High School Program is a unit of work that uses an inquiry-based and integrated approach to learning. It has been designed to be student-centred and interactive. The content addresses concepts around food properties, healthy eating, food and fibre production, food insecurity and consumer choice, as well as the impact of new technologies on designing solutions.

The production of the Use It Up Recipe Card, Information Sheet and Fight Food Waste Promo takes the students through a design process that develops skills in analysing needs, generating ideas, justifying suitable materials and developing design criteria and project plans.
